# **CHARACTERISTICS**

# SIZE:

Adults can be as large as 12 inches.

## **COLOR:**

The color of the carapace (shell) can vary between greenish yellow to grey and brownish and is marked with yellow lines. The underside of the shell is lighter with dark spots. Skin is generally dark green with white or yellow striping. The most distinguishable characteristic is the red stripe behind its eye.

#### SHAPE:

The carapace is oval shaped with sharp edges and a rough face. The underside is flat and smooth.

#### **COMMON NAMES:**

Red-Eared Slider, Pond Slider.

# HABITAT:

Ponds, lakes, marshes, and in slow-moving rivers that have soft, muddy bottoms.

## NATIVE TO:

Southeastern US through Central and South America

### **PREVENTION AND SPREAD:**

A common pet, these species have become an invasive species through abandonment in the wild by owners that no longer want them. The best way to prevent the spread of the species is to not release any pets into the wild.

#### **IMPACTS:**

Can spread diseases to native turtles and outcompete native counterparts for resources.

# **NATIVE LOOKALIKES:**

Native painted turtle (*Chrysemys picta*) have vibrant colored undersides whereas red-eared sliders do not. Red-eared sliders also have more domed shells.
